

Birthstone – Ruby

July's birthstone, the ruby, is one of the rarest gems in the world. It is revered by many cultures for its deep red color and prized by royalty the world over. Rubies are so highly regarded in the Hindu religion that it is said the offering of a ruby to Krishna will guarantee reincarnation as an emperor or king. Rubies mined in Burma are the most expensive gem per carat in the world. Because of their superior crimson color, Burmese rubies are called "Pigeon's Blood." Throughout history, rubies have been thought to aid the wearer's circulation and protect them from harm by turning dark in the presence of people with ill intentions, assuming, of course, that the wearer is the rightful owner. Supposedly, Catharine of Aragon foretold her impending divorce from King Henry VIII after seeing a ruby she was wearing turn dark

Flower of the Month – Larkspur

The Larkspur has petals that grow together forming a spur at the end, thus the name. When in bloom, these lush flower spikes are lovely in the garden. And when cut, they look splendid in a vase, too. Colors include light and dark pink, blue, rose, lavender, and white. Larkspur is a member of the delphinium family. The many varieties of larkspur can range in height from one to seven feet. Three species were introduced into English gardens in the mid-1500s. Americans started planting them in the preRevolutionary era. Those settlers used larkspur to make blue dye. Ancient uses for delphiniums included driving away scorpions. The flowers are known to symbolize love and affection. They also are said to convey a feeling of lightness or levity.
