Are you Waffling?



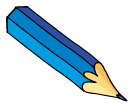
On August 24, 1869, Cornelius Swartwout was awarded a patent for inventing a new, improved waffle iron. The first waffle irons date back to the 15th century in Holland, where waffles were baked on the open hearth in long-handled irons. Instead of the recognizable grid of deep wells, waffles were patterned with coats of arms, religious icons, or landscapes. These irons were direct descendants of medieval irons used to bake wafers for religious communion. Cont.

Swartwout is credited with developing a new version of a waffle iron that could be used on either a wood or gas burning stove. In his design, two cast-iron plates were attached in such a manner that they could be rotated and flipped within a banded collar, allowing both sides of the waffle to cook on the stove top. Swartwout's irons came in a variety of sizes with the tell-tale grid of wells on each side. Why do waffles today have that gridded and pocketed pattern? Some say that it's to cook a light, crisp waffle, while others argue that the pockets were created to hold rich maple syrup

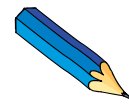
Make Me a Match
